

The District engaged in meaningful consultation with stakeholders in several ways. The broadest efforts to engage stakeholders occurred via a District-wide survey that was conducted in October 2021. The survey was sent via e-mail to District families, posted on the District website and social media, and provided to staff (including union members), Board members, and students. The District received 808 responses. The survey had targeted questions about possible spending for ARP ESSER funds, but also included a free text response for respondents to provide additional feedback. The District publicly presented the survey results at its November 15, 2021 Facilities-Finance Committee meeting to elicit additional feedback in a public forum. The District also discussed ARP ESSER funding at the January 18, 2022 Finance Committee meeting for another public input opportunity. Furthermore, the District provided its administrative team (spanning education and operations) with a form to submit specific requests for consideration under ARP ESSER. These requests were evaluated to prepare this application.

5. Use of Stakeholder Input

As described above, the stakeholder input played an integral role in the development of the District's ARP ESSER plan. The vast majority of the requests from the administrative team were incorporated into the spending plan submitted herewith. Additionally, survey respondents were in general alignment with the programmatic goals that the District had set forth for use of the ARP ESSER funds. Because there was some overlap between administrative and public

requests, District officials were confident that the stakeholder input was considered as part of the ARP ESSER plan.

The District's application includes \$1,153,617 to address the academic impact of lost instructional time (aka, learning loss). This allocation is \$561,581 greater than the minimum required allocation, thereby demonstrating the District's commitment to this very important topic. The plan to address these academic impacts include professional development training for teachers to improve early literacy outcomes and funding for teacher on assignment (TOA) positions. TOA positions are temporary in nature, and would therefore not continue upon the expiration of ESSER funds. These positions would be utilized to provide math instruction support at the secondary level, math intervention support at the three District Title I schools, and provide support for improvement in English Language Arts (ELA) at the elementary level. The intervention strategies will include (a) providing small group, high dosage tutoring and double-doses of instruction during the school day in literacy and mathematics provided by a consistent adult over time (b) addressing the mental health and social emotional needs of students on a daily basis, and providing additional measures of support to the most vulnerable students through counseling and social work services and (c) supporting classroom teachers in creating and delivering engaging lessons in literacy and mathematics that allow for multiple points of access by students who may have varying levels of background knowledge and understanding. Diagnostic assessments will be administered on a regular basis to determine the effectiveness of the interventions; progress made in enrolled classes will also be monitored through other assessment scores and interviews with students and staff. Delivery of these interventions will be specifically targeted to and prioritized for individual students and student populations (e.g. Students with IEPs, ELLs) who we know have been most disproportionately impacted. This can be achieved through purposeful and planned scheduling of supports. During the initial two years of the Pandemic, the district collected information on students who had minimal levels of engagement of learning and/or excessive absences. Those records have been maintained and will be used along with current academic data in planning the delivery of services. The services will also be provided to students who may have attended and participated in learning during the Pandemic school building closures, but who have not been successful academically for reasons that may be related to trauma experienced during the past few years.

Continuity of Services: The District included \$1,727,313 in its application to sustain educational services, and intends to accomplish this in myriad ways. The District intends to increase its commitment to students' social, emotional, and mental health through investments in contracted Student Assistance Program (SAP) counseling services and contracted social work services at each level of instruction (elementary, middle, and high school), and the employment of two additional elementary guidance counselors at the elementary level to better align the District's caseloads with those recommended by the American School Counselor Association. Furthermore, the District has allocated funds in its application for recruitment and retention strategies that will hopefully ease the impact of support staff shortages that are resulting in a reduced level of operational services. Also, the District intends to invest in professional cybersecurity services to assist with the implementation of multi-factor authentication and to evaluate the District's overall cybersecurity policies and procedures. This is critical due to the increasing use of electronic educational resources (even while offering in-person instruction). A network outage, for any period of time, due to a cyber attack would cripple the District's ability to offer instruction. Finally, the District's application includes funds for contracted educational services that are utilized in the summer for credit recovery and upgrades to the media labs at two District elementary schools, which are a critical component of the District curriculum. Access to instruction strategies will include (a) providing small group, high dosage tutoring and doubledoses of instruction during the school day in literacy and mathematics provided by a consistent adult over time (b) addressing the mental health and social emotional needs of students on a daily basis, and providing additional measures of support to the most vulnerable students through counseling and social work services and (c) supporting classroom teachers in creating and delivering engaging lessons in literacy and mathematics that allow for multiple points of access by students who may have varying levels of background knowledge and understanding. Interventions will be specifically targeted to and prioritized for individual students and student populations (e.g. Students with IEPs, ELLs) who we know have been most disproportionately impacted. The district collected information on students who had minimal levels of engagement of learning and/or excessive absences. Those records have been maintained and will be used along with current academic data in planning the delivery of services. The services will also be provided to students who may have attended and participated in learning during the Pandemic school building closures, but who have not been successful academically for reasons that may be related to trauma experienced during the past few years. Mitigation Strategies: The District included \$179,248 in its application for mitigation strategies. These strategies include the compensation to nurses and other staff to provide a robust antigen testing program for staff and students and replenishment of the District's supply of personal protective equipment (including but not limited to masks, sanitizer, and air filters). The other mitigation strategy that will be used is the purchase of cafeteria tables at the Hatboro-Horsham High School, which will allow for safer, more effective physical distancing during lunch periods.
