

Hatboro-Horsham Honors 2023 Hall of Fame Class

Hatboro-Horsham School District was pleased to honor the [2023 Hall of Fame Induction](#) class on April 21 at Hatboro-Horsham High School. Inductees included three alumni: Dan Fucito, Class of 1993; Brian Miller, Class of 1973; Colleen Wolfe, Class of 2003; and the first Keith Valley Middle School Principal Dr. Richard Luoma.

Founded in 1990, the Hatboro-Horsham Hall of Fame honors alumni and others for their outstanding achievements or significant contributions to the district, community, and society. Inductees exemplify the excellence of the Hatboro-Horsham educational experience and were nominated by community members.

The event included an informal breakfast, induction ceremony, and a catered luncheon for family and invited guests. Inductees gave a short speech and HHHS students were also present for the ceremony.

“This morning we had the opportunity to recognize four very distinct individuals, all with different stories and paths to success,” said HHHS Principal Dr. Dennis M. Williams Jr. “These individuals have left an indelible footprint in various career fields that include education, military service, law and politics, and business and sports entertainment.”

The 2023 Hall of Fame Class are:

Dan Fucito, Military Service



A 1993 graduate of HHHS, Dan Fucito was inducted into the Hall of Fame for his military service and says that HHHS taught him “perseverance, self-reliance and hard work.”

Fucito began his new role as program manager of the Unmanned Carrier Aviation program office (PMA-268) in February 2023. He will be crucial in the Navy’s efforts to enhance its unmanned aviation capabilities. Additionally, his leadership will be critical in delivering the MQ-25 Stingray, which is expected to provide the carrier air wing with a multi-mission aerial refueling capability.

“We are at the dawn of a new age of naval aviation, and I wouldn’t want to be anywhere else,” Fucito said.

An alumnus of Penn State University, the University of Michigan and the U.S. Naval Test Pilot School, Fucito has more than 2,000 flight hours and supported multiple combat missions.

Dr. Richard Luoma, Education

Boston native Dr. Richard Luoma received degrees from Fitchburg State University, Boston University and Lehigh University, and was inducted into the Hall of Fame due to his impact in education in the District. He served as the first Principal of Keith Valley Middle School, the building that is now Simmons Elementary School, when it opened in 1972. As Principal, he was responsible for running a middle school with open-concept floor plans and team teaching, which was a big educational shift in the 1970s. In 1987, he became the Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction, helping the District transition to state standards, collaborative learning initiatives and project-based learning.



While working in Hatboro-Horsham School District, Luoma says he learned “hard work, integrity and dedication.”

Brian Miller, Politics & Law



Brian Miller graduated from HHHS in 1973 and was inducted into the Hall of Fame due to his influence in politics and law. After graduation, he earned degrees at Temple University, Westminster Theological Seminary and the University of Texas.

In 2020, the U.S. Senate confirmed Miller as the Special Inspector General for Pandemic Recovery, ensuring that 2.2 million dollars were spent appropriately and saved thousands of businesses across the country.

Before that role, he held many prior positions in government including Senior Associate to White House Counsel, Inspector General of the U.S General Services Administration, among many others, working under President George W. Bush, President Barack Obama, President Donald Trump and President Joe Biden.

As an HHHS alumnus, Miller says high school taught him “diligence, perseverance, hard work and honesty.”

Colleen Wolfe, Business & Entertainment

Voted most artistic for the HHHS Class of 2003, Colleen Wolfe was also known around school as a figure skater. Skating since age 6, Wolfe received permission to skip gym class at HHHS so she could practice skating.

A graduate of Drexel University, Wolfe was inducted into the Hall of Fame because of her contributions in business and



entertainment. She got her start in Philadelphia working at Sports Radio 94 WIP, Comcast SportsNet and FOX 29. She joined the NFL Network in 2014 and hosts a variety of NFL shows including NFL GameDay Kickoff, Power Rankings, as well as providing on-location event coverage for the Super Bowl and NFL Draft.

She says HHHS taught her to be “curious, creative, motivated and disciplined.”
